




Excited

But in spite of his busy schedule, he always finds the time to be a friend, to listen, or to help with a problem. For all of these things and much more, we thank you.




















Religion . . . Our Sustainer



The Candlelight Service adds a special touch to the holidays with carols, candles, and true happy feelings about the birth of our Saviour.










usic at Shenandoah Valley Academy is applied as a form of art. It provides students with the opportunity to improve and show their talents.










Patriotism







All photographs were taken by staff photographers and printed in the school's photo lab. Color pictures in the opening section were taken by staff photographers, and developed by Gitchell's Photography, Harrisonburg, VA. Color enlargements were made in the school's photo lab with the color print processor. Gentry Photography, Harrisonburg, VA was responsible for taking the people section portraits.

Headlines were set in 36 pt. lydian and Helvetica Medium Outline Dry Transfer letters were handset by staff. Subheads were in 12 pt. lydian, copy and captions were set in 8 pt. lydian. l0 and 12 pt. lydian was used for special copy. Dropped initials were handset as artwork from Zlp-a-Tone 48 pt. Optima Dry Transfer letters.

Color tool lines in senior section were Zipaline matte finish 2 pt. tape lines, and were handset on MSTC boards by staff.

All layouts were designed by staff using 3 and 2-plus-2 column systems. Theme and Divider pages were done in free-style.

All copy was written by students of SVA. The 144 page book was printed on 80-pound Gloss #191 paper. 450 books were printed.
