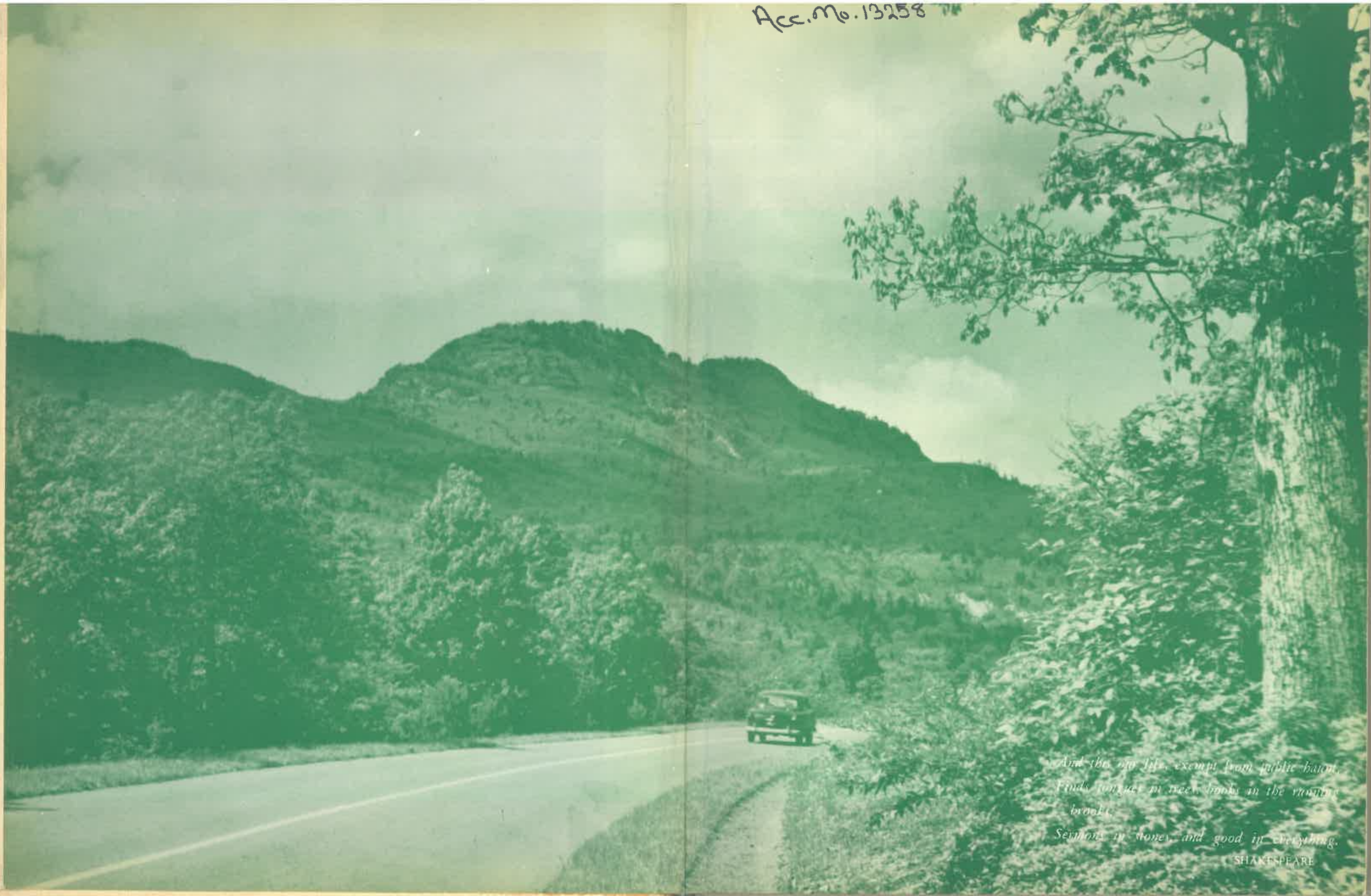

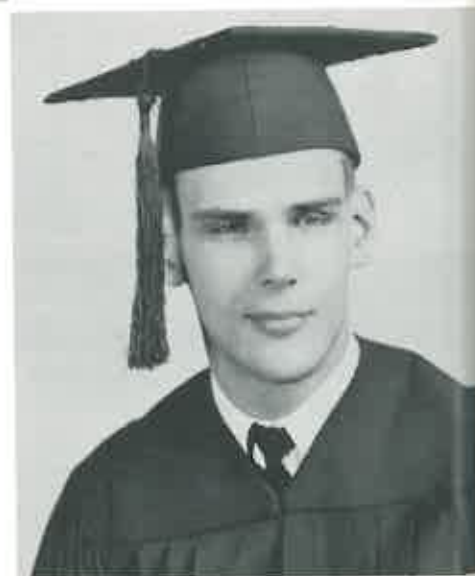


LEAL DICKSON, President

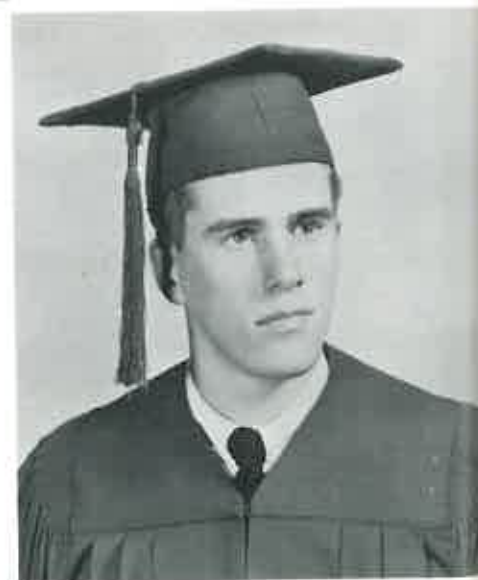
SUSAN ANDREWS

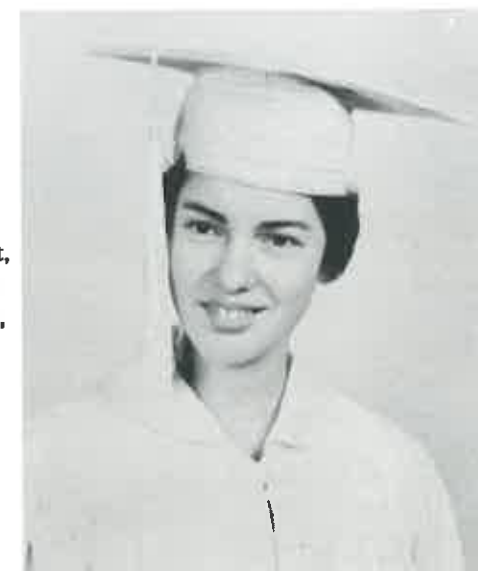
PHILIP BALDWIN

CARL BLACKBURN

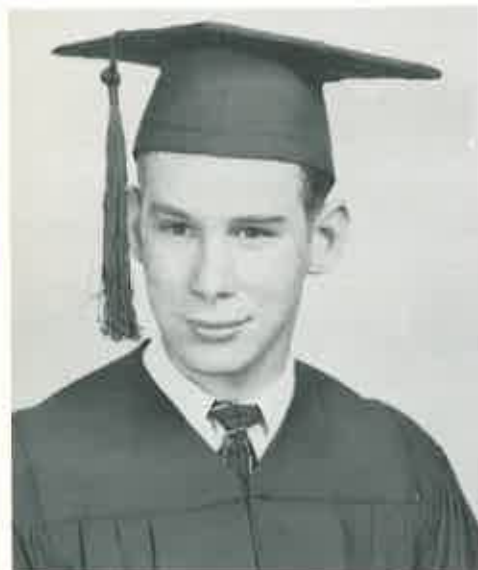

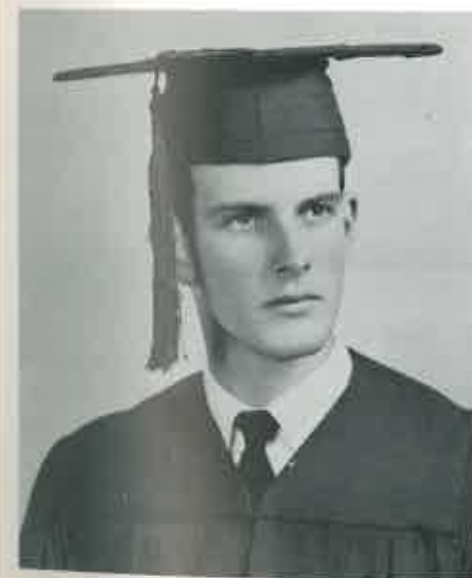
ELIZABETH GAGALSKI

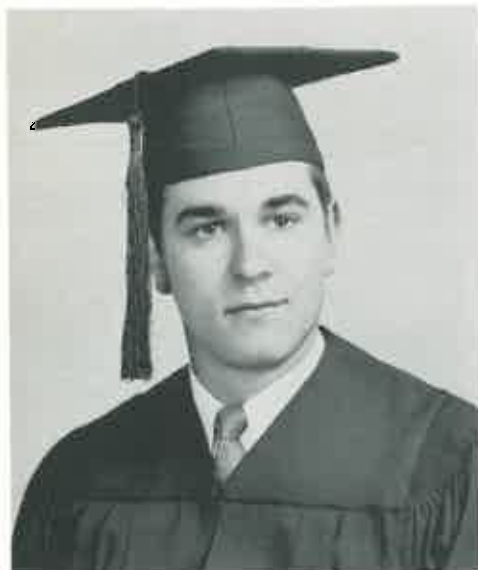
WENDELL FRY

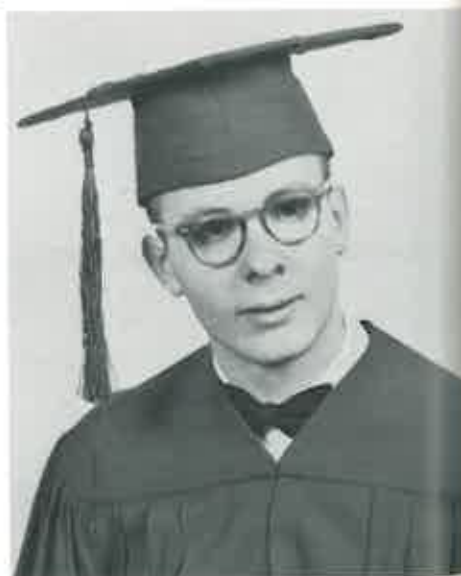
EDWARD HAMMOCK

PATRICIA KNUPP

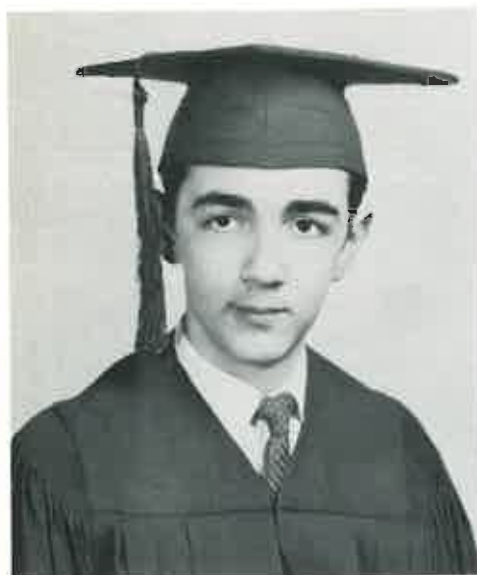

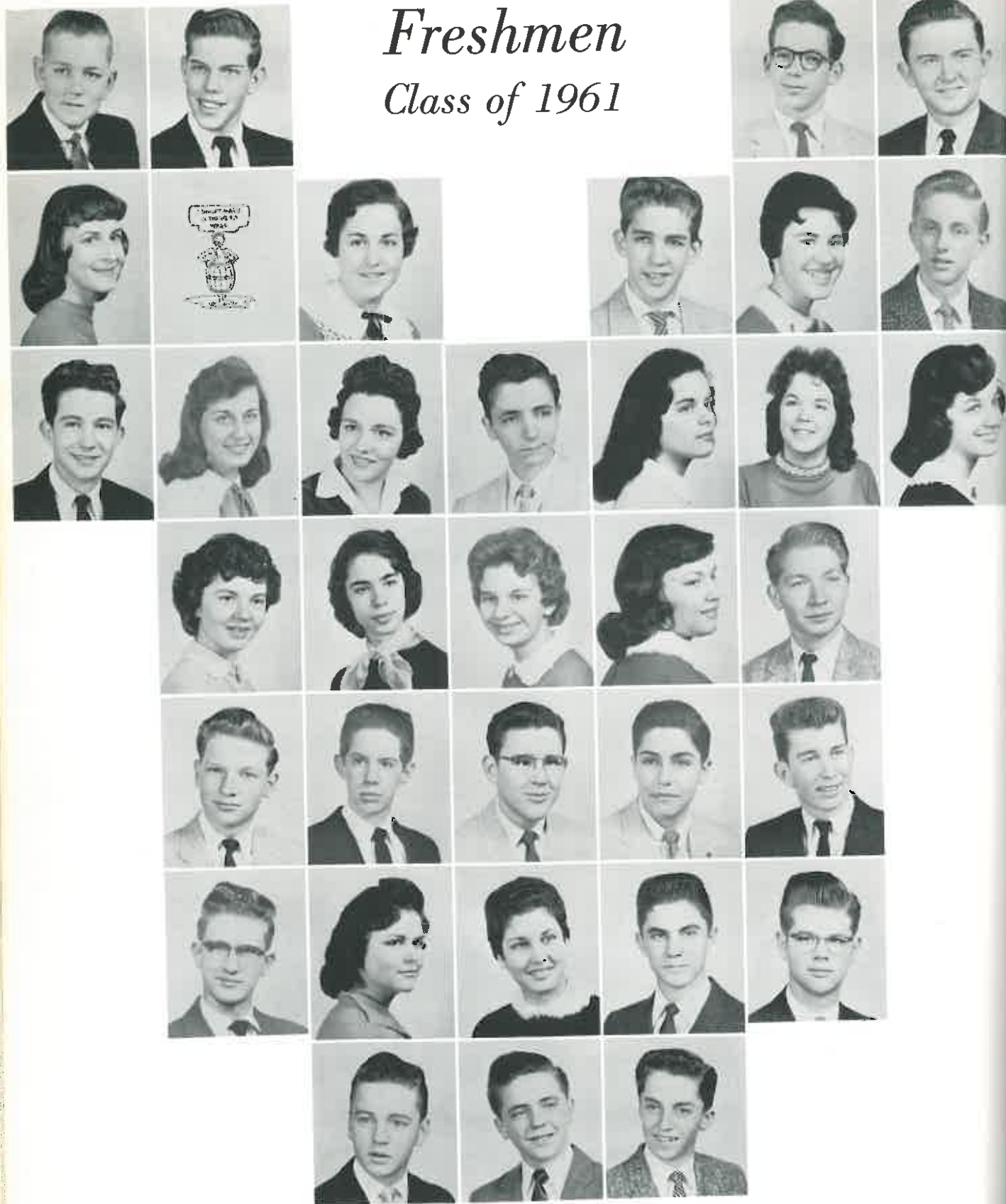

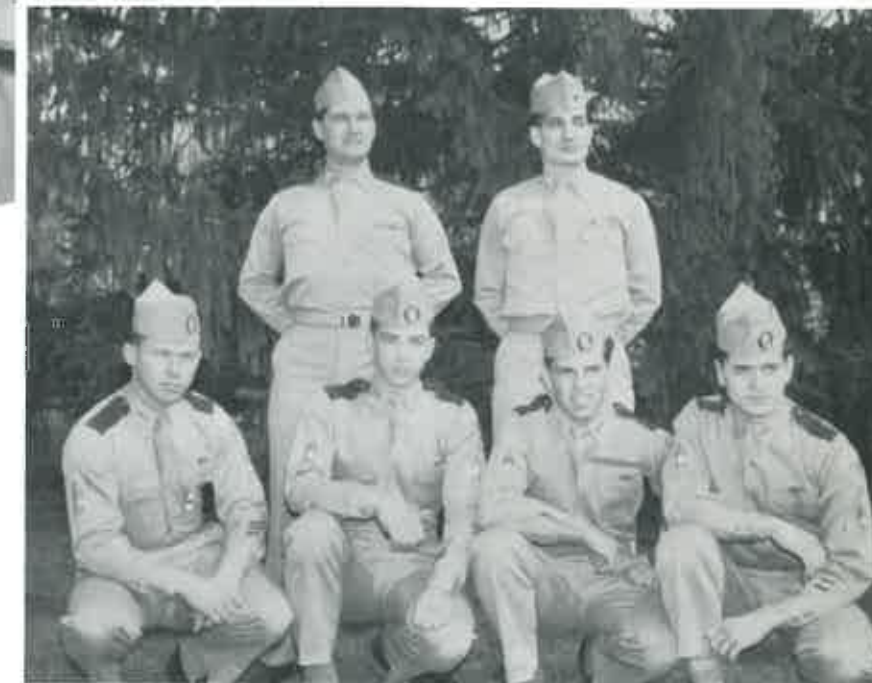
