Long hours are spent there practicing but eventually the sour notes blend into dynamic sounds which have been heard in churches throughout the Potomac Conference.

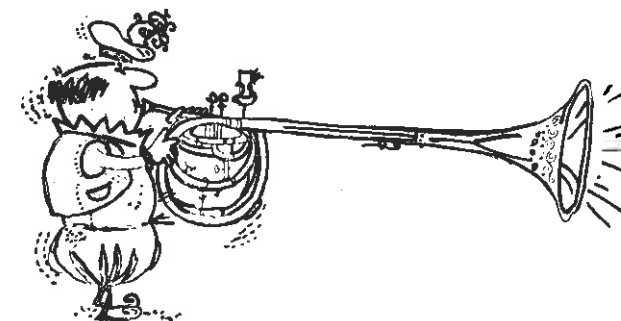
The S. V. A. band is really on the move this year; the sounds produced are the greatest ever. A new addition this year is a beautiful set of chimes which keeps the percussion section busy.
