







Involve Over 20% of Student Body

It is important that pupils, as a part of general education, learn to appreciate, to understand, to create, and to criticize with discrimination those products of the mind, the voice, the hand, and the body.

Youth today face two radically different forces. Schools push for excellence in all subjects. At the same time, the mass media outside the schools all too frequently focuses students' attention on shallow, mediocre models of the good life. Students exercise value standards as they make independent, intellectual judgments about the artistic quality in all their experiences.

All secondary school students, therefore, need experiences in understanding music, art, and literature. Otherwise they base their decisions on the stereotype and prejudices which can easily be manipulated by the mass media and by superficial shifts in fashion. Students need to learn how to exercise social responsibility in making personal and group decisions about the arts. The music department at SVA is attempting to provide this experience.




