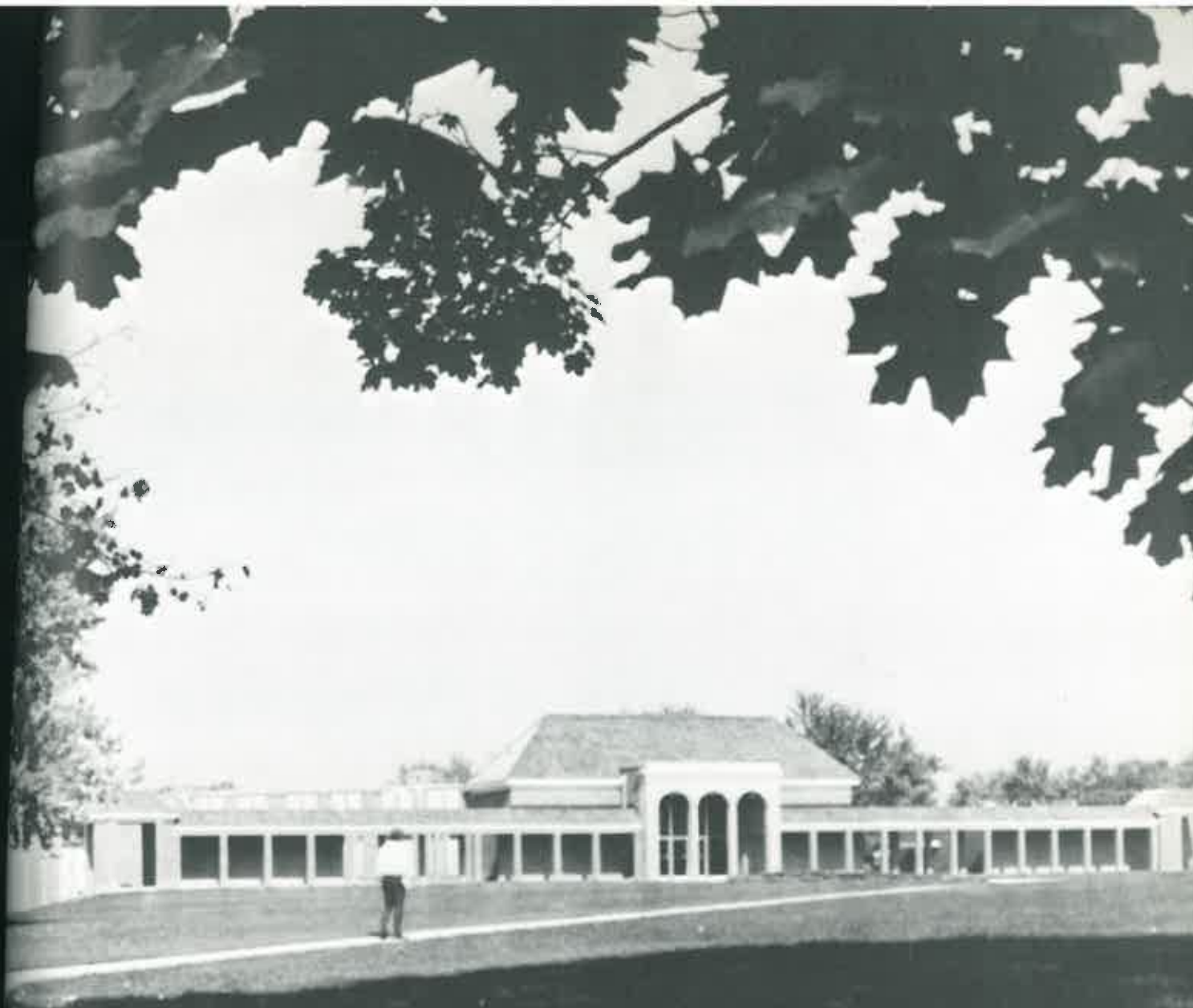

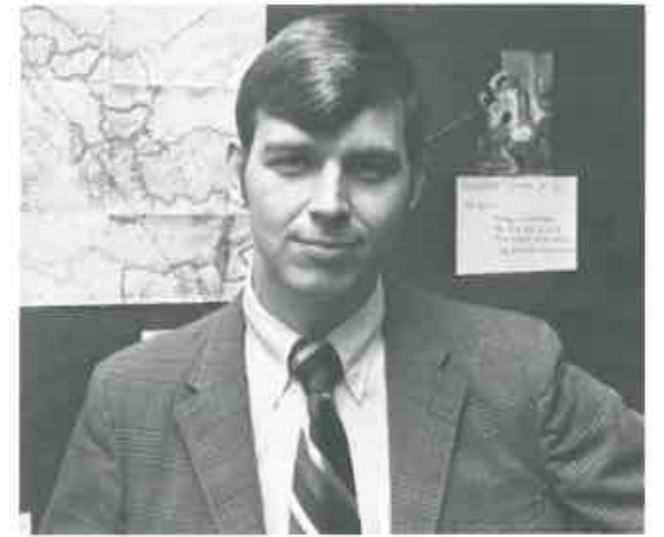

Living with each other is a maturing experience. Learning to give and take, to communicate, and to work together are all a part of this maturing experience.

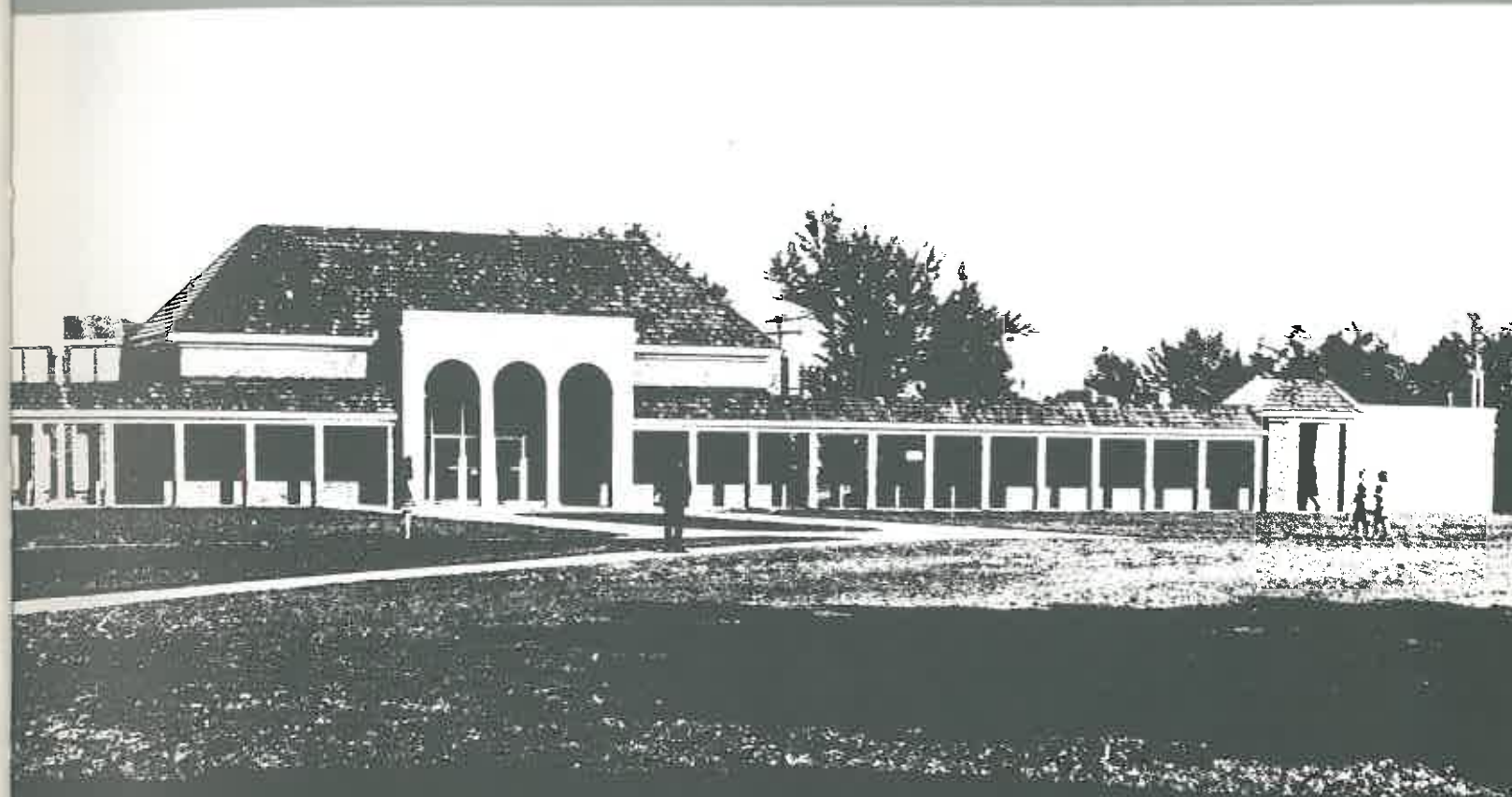


When people decide to make God a part of their lives, they discover a whole new dimension. We feel that God gives us an additional reason for living.

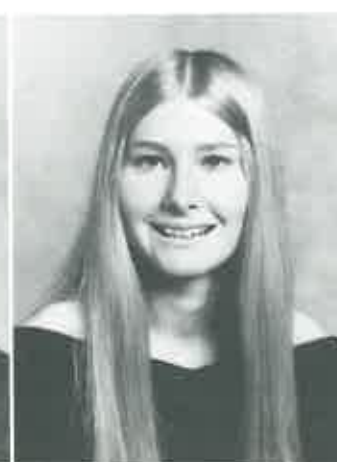

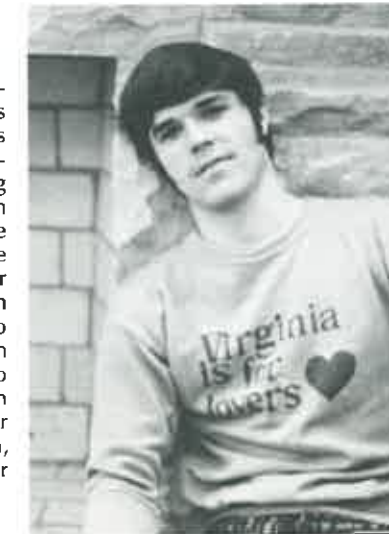


Marcia Little

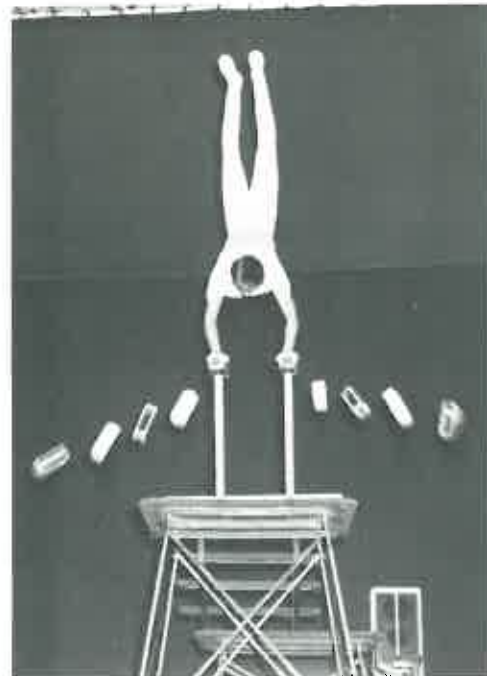

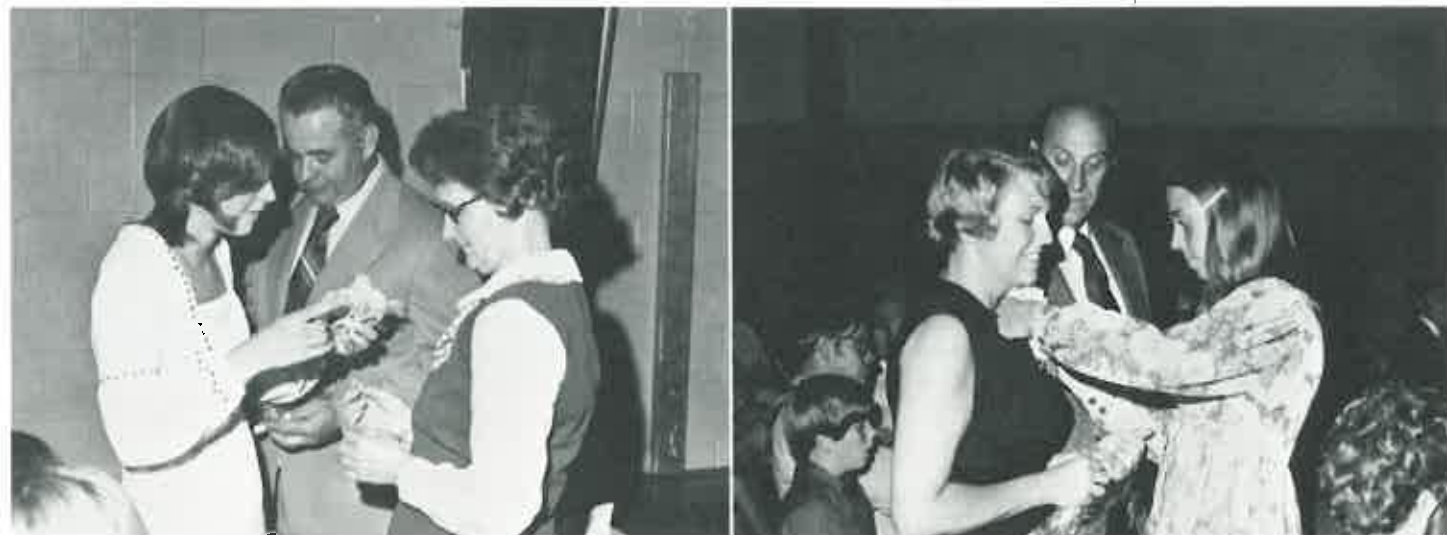
