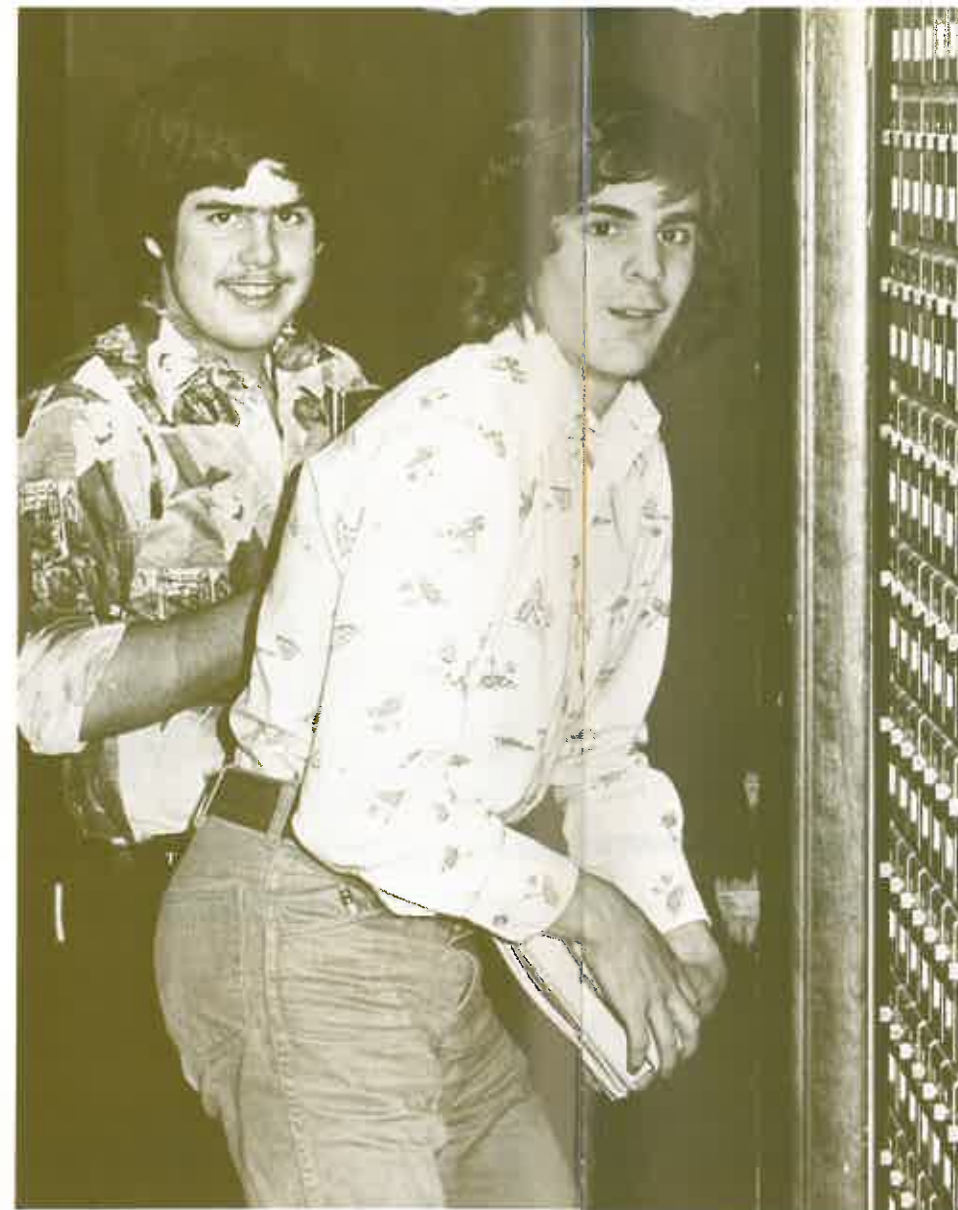
"One morning I looked out the window and the road was gone."

All earthly delights are sweeter in expectation than in enjoyment; but all spiritual pleasures more in fruition than in expectation.

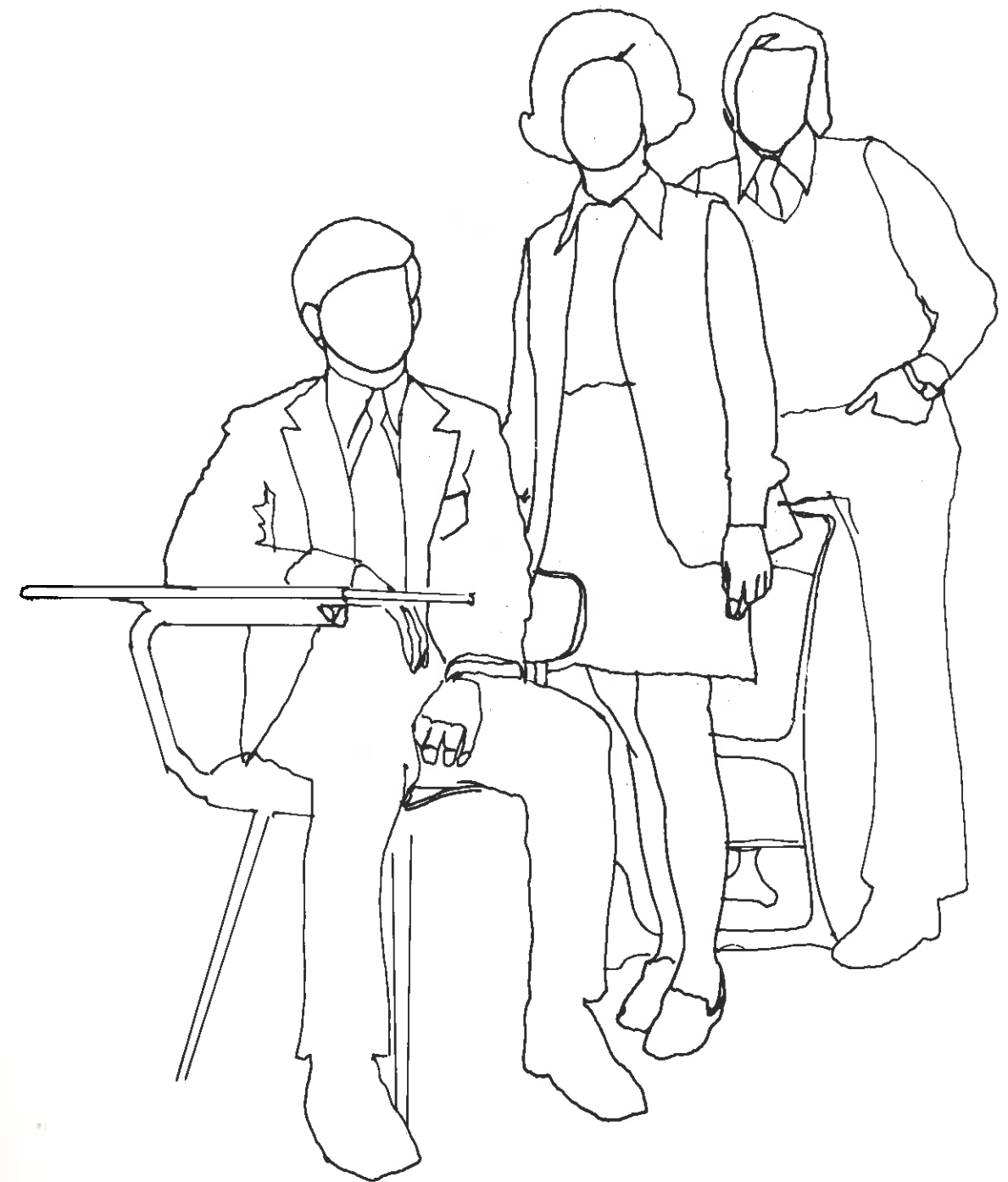
