

move into the next set of chal-lenges, refreshed and with new awareness of why we're here and what we're about.


















Shenandoah living helps us pass through those "terrible teens" which, in our honest moments, we admit must be exasperating to those adults around us because they are so exasperating to us.



Still, the child in us gradually gives way to the adult struggling to get out. A job, studies, trips and appointments. All of these lend to the maturing process which we patiently endure.
















Math & Physics

English

From grammar to Shakespeare and a lot of stopovers in between. That briefly describes the English curriculum here at S.V.A. We learn all over how to read, from simple short stories to the medieval *Beowulf*. We write as never before, simple sentences, complete paragraphs and then finally long, literary essays which teachus research skills from how to use an encyclopedia to writing fully footnoted themes. We learn to speak before an audience, but, more important, we acquire confidence in our ability to communicate and in the value of what we have to say. Mr. White and Mr. Garey handle the English classes in professional style.

Music

The Music Department offers a veritable smorgasboard of groups, activities, classes, tours, programs, and other assorted delicacies. Choir Director, Mr. Taylor, brings good music from both the choir and bell choir he directs.


Worshipping In The Dorms.






The evening ended with a delicious lasagne dinner served on the field. Then we held worship and announced the winners in the elections.

Boys' Club Barn Party







The Valentine's Party was an enchanted evening and only time will tell how many of Cupid's arrows inflicted the mortal wound.






















Cardiovascular Softball


