Charles D. Zirkle returned to his father's home along the Shenandoah River in 1905 to die shortly of tuberculosis brought on by an accident in Baltimore. Before his death, Charles requested that his father, John P. Zirkle (see 1885 atlas map on pp. 2,3), grant his inheritance early so that he might donate 40 acres to the Conference for the establishment of a Christian school. Father John agreed. John's will and the deed were prepared. Charles prayed that God might let him live until the transaction was completed. On a Friday afternoon the property was staked off. On Sabbath Charles rested. And on Sunday he died.

Thus, SVA was born out of a vision of Christian education by an early SDA pioneer in the Shenandoah Valley. Would he be pleased with his legacy today? Certainly, the physical aspects testify to seventy-five years of progress. Only the final reckoning will attest to the contribution SVA has made over the years to the sreading of the Gospel message and to the preparation of young people for Eden restored.

Since 1903 SVA has charted a steady course, with the goal in mind envisioned by young Charles Zirkle. When the final period is placed at the end of earth's history, we believe SVA will have been true to its heritage. Continuity of beliefs and practices will be SVA's distinguishing characteristic.

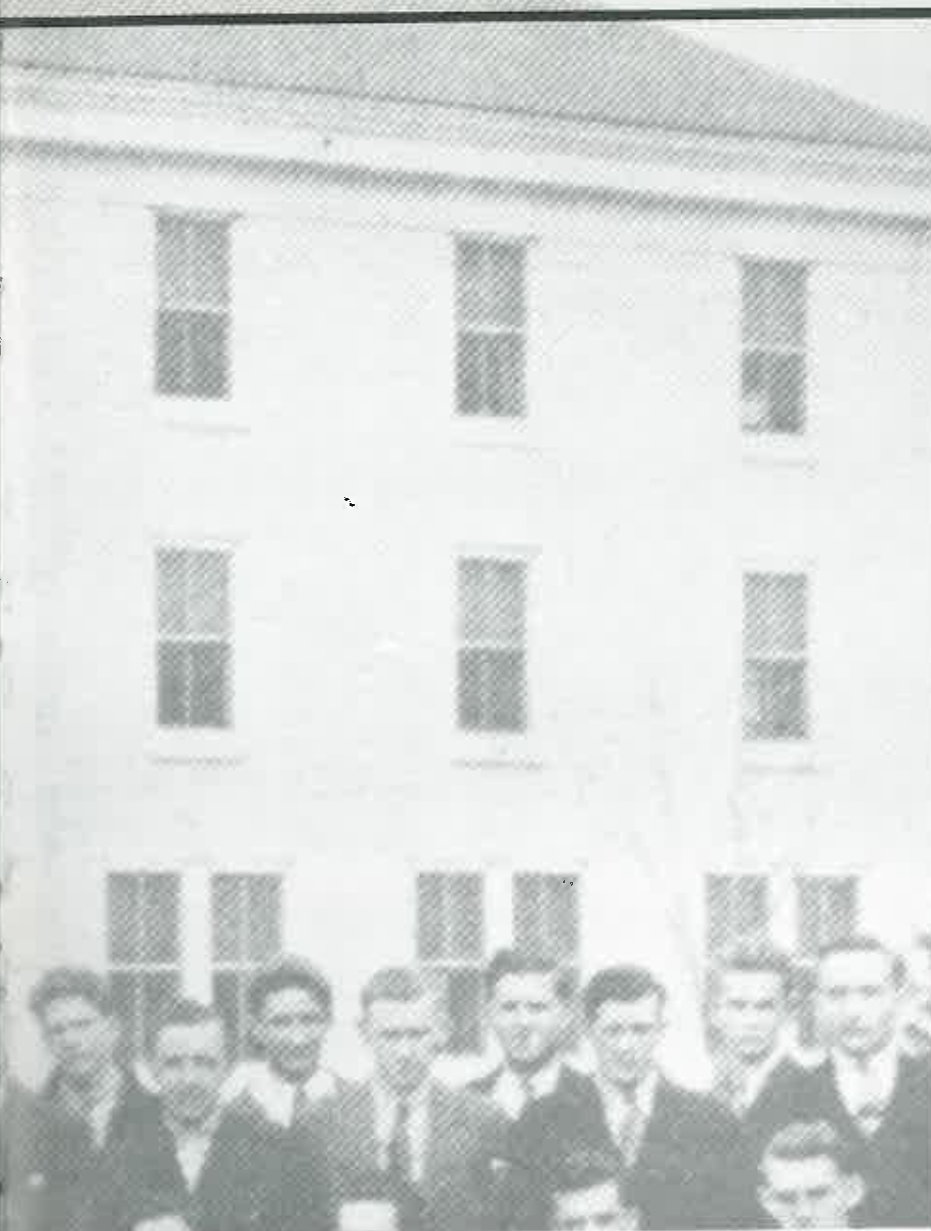
His work with the Alumni Association has kept him in touch with the SVA graduates. He has been made an honorary alumnus and now serves as executive secretary of the association.

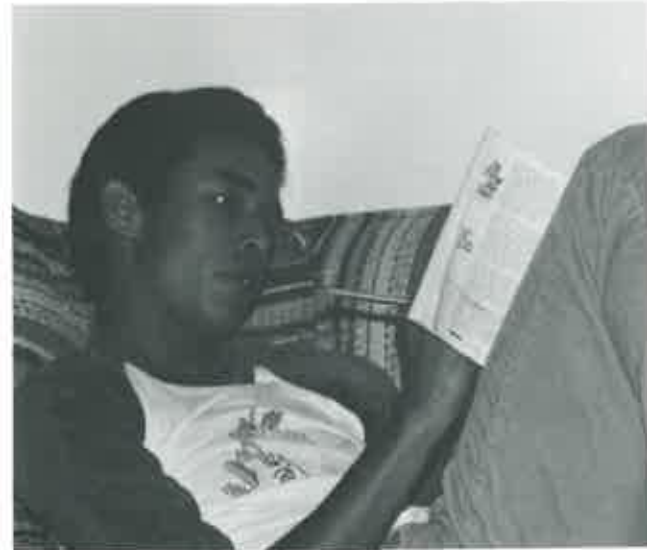

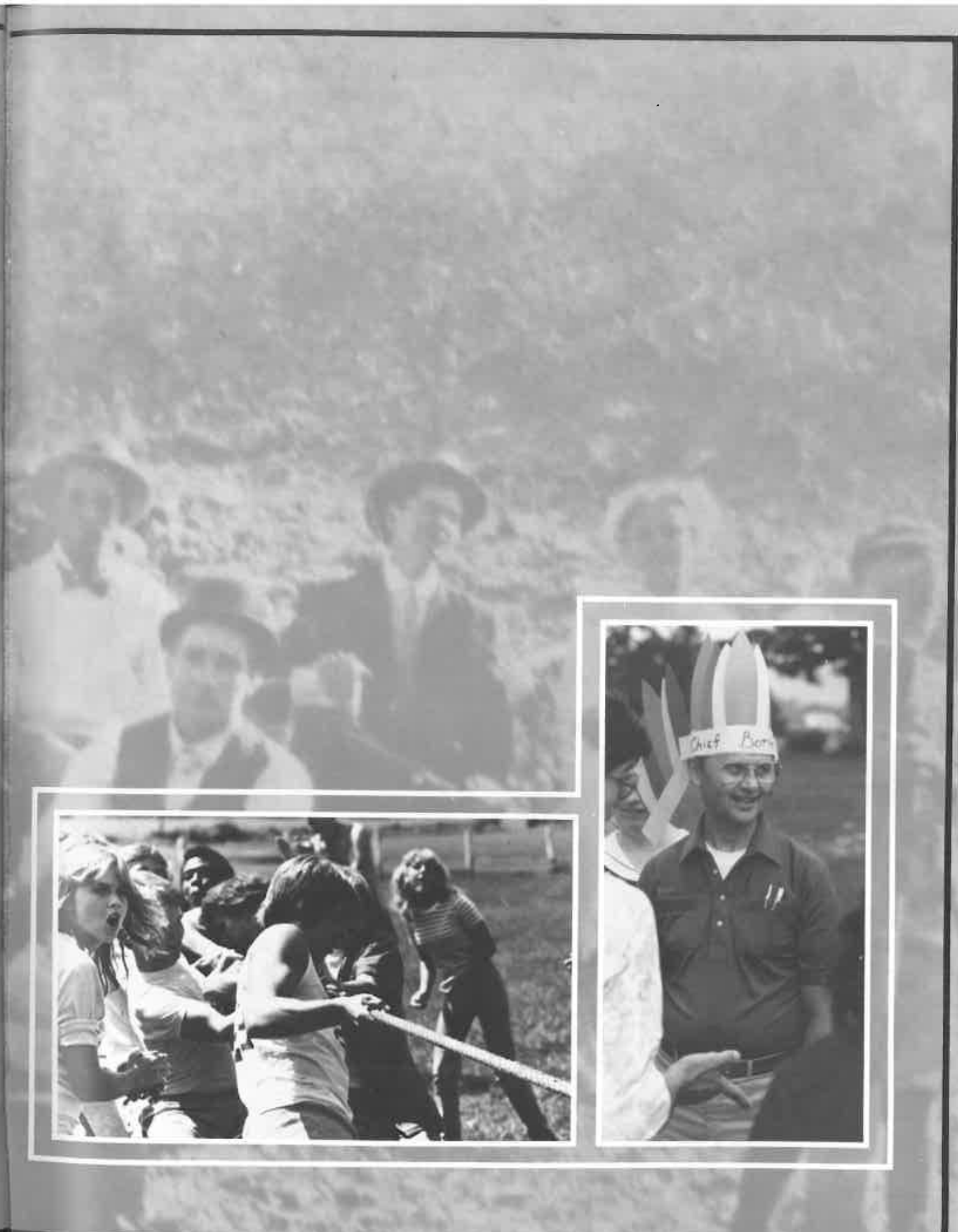

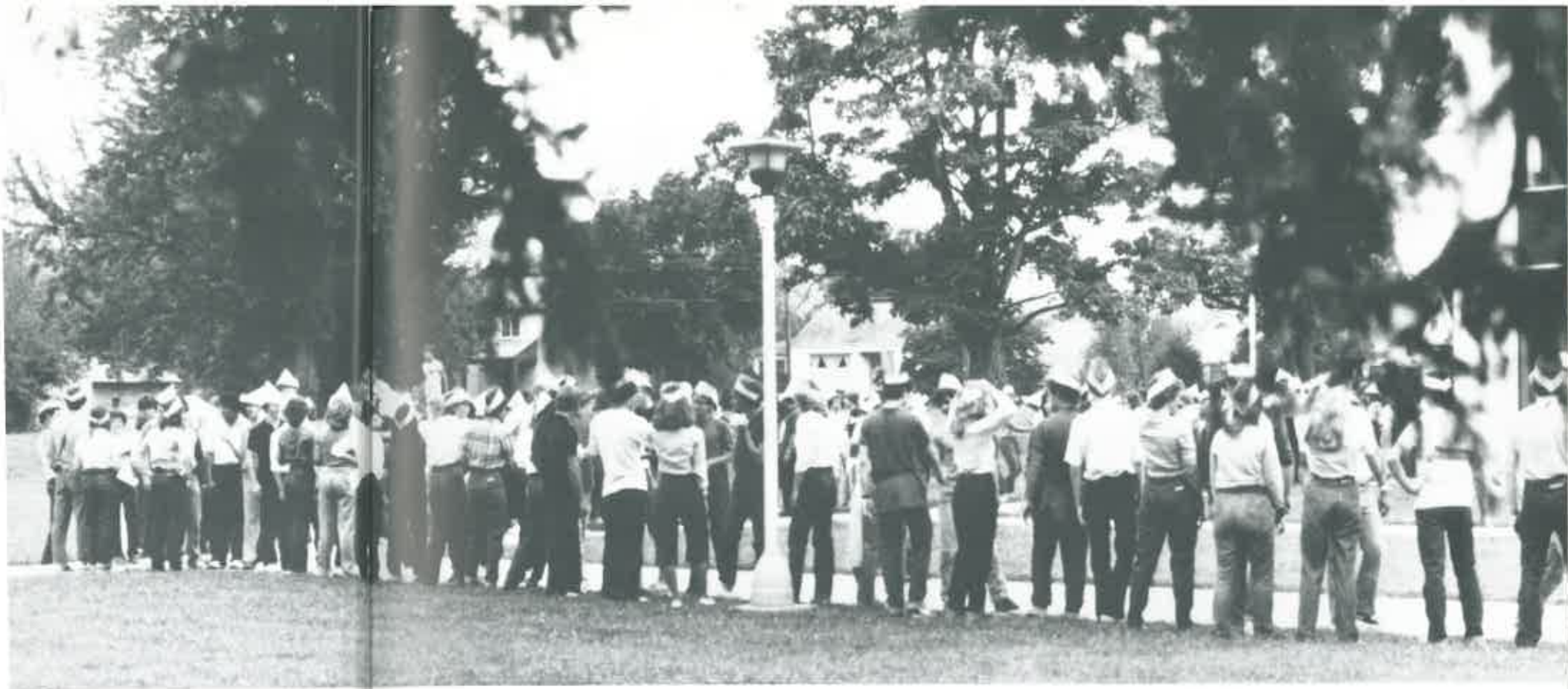

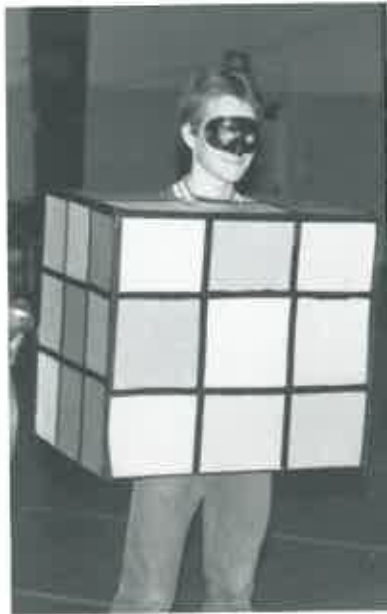

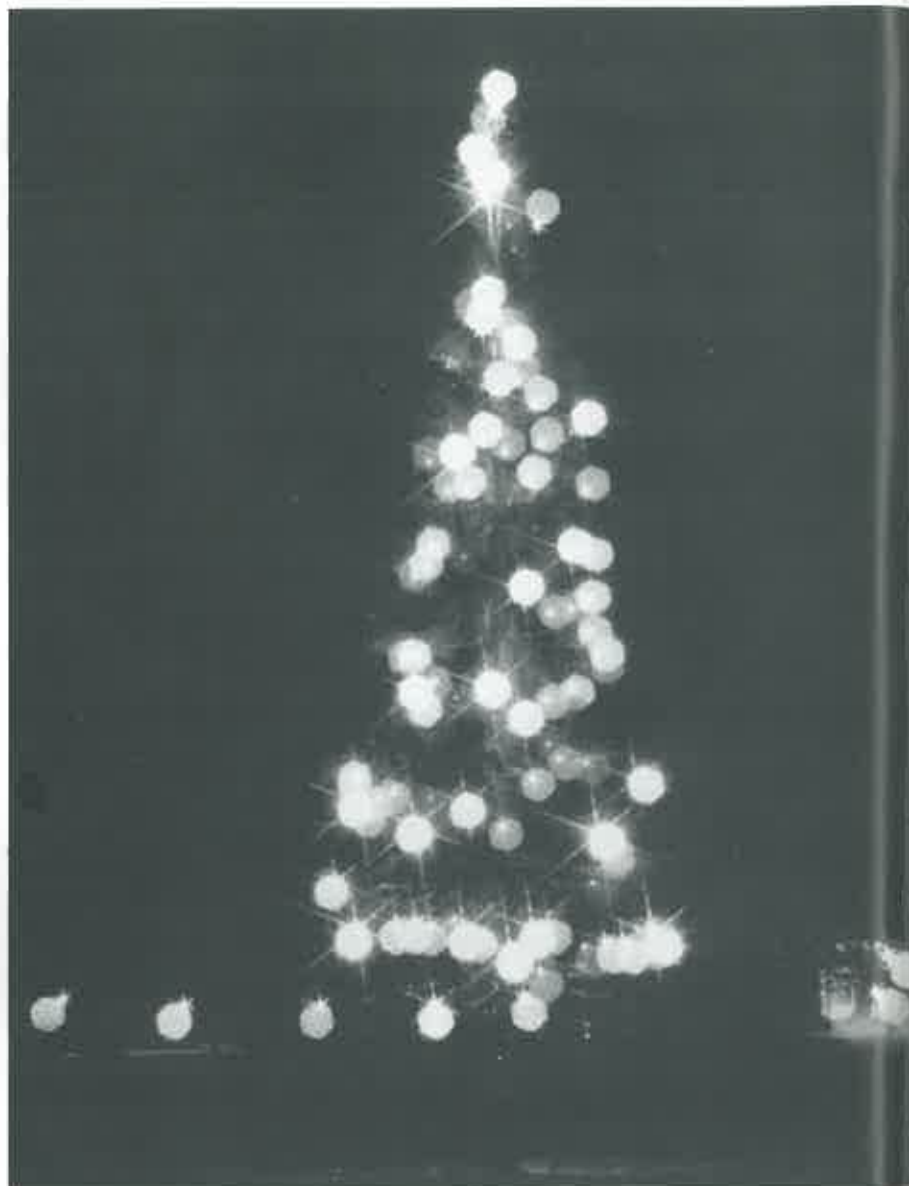
S.A. Christmas Party

Joe Deely and Mike Halifax show the rewards of adopting children the evening of the Christmas Party. Mike was the lucky father of two, a boy and a little girl.

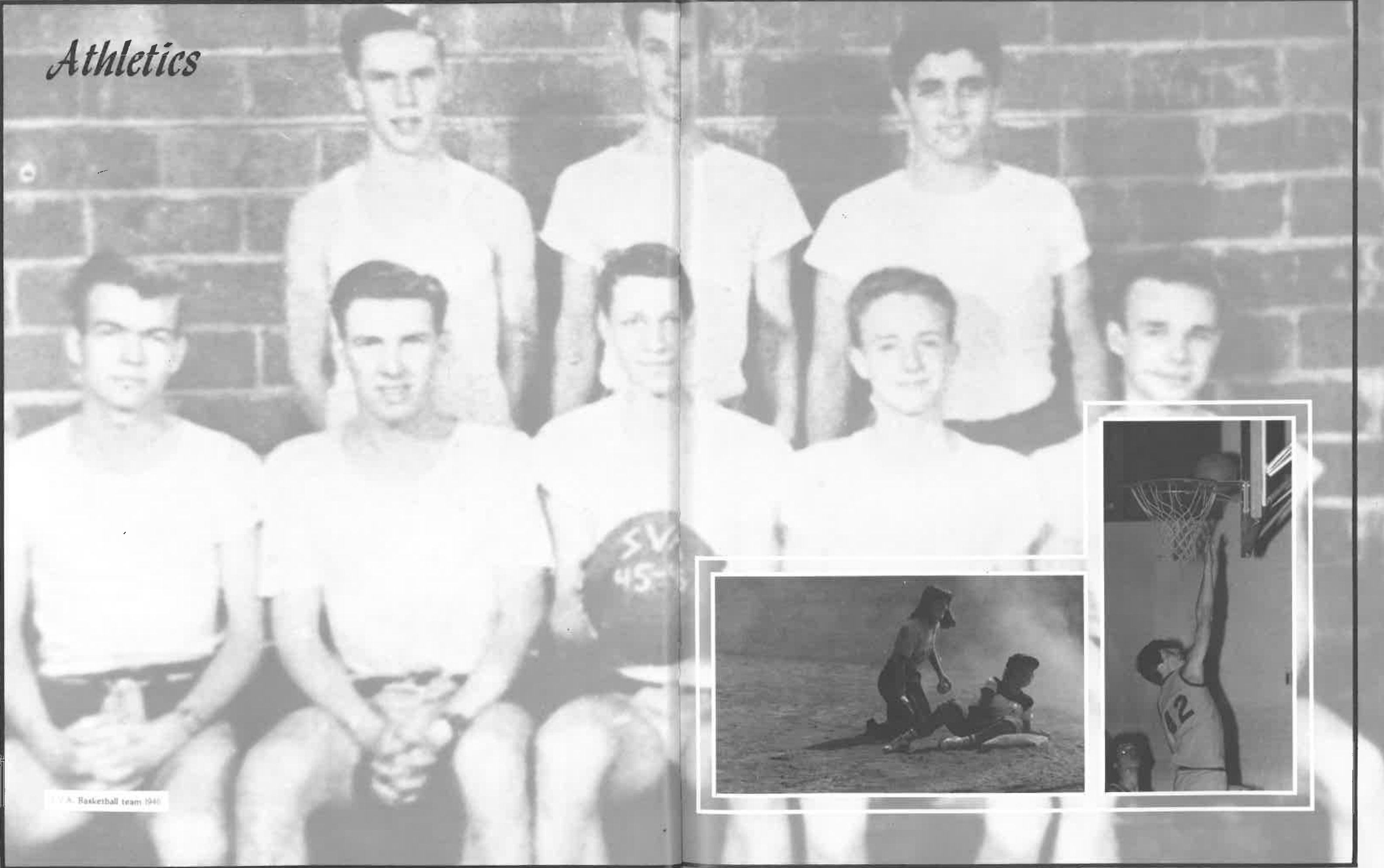


After a light meal in the cafeteria, everyone gathered around for a story. Barry Ronk delighted the audience with his version of "A Night Before Christmas".
